

Westminster Presbyterian Church, Munster, Indiana Minutes of the Congregation meeting January 22, 2017

The meeting was called to order in the Sanctuary at 6:10 p.m. by Moderator Quincy A. Worthington. Pastor Quincy opened the meeting with a prayer. A quorum was present. Clerk Jim Yackel offered a tribute to those members who died during 2016.

The meeting recessed at 6:15 p.m. at which time the Corporation meeting convened. Minutes of the January 24, 2016 meeting and the September 25, 2016 meeting of the congregation were approved.

President Douglas Williams reported that no change in the Terms of Call for Pastor Worthington were recommended at this time.

Treasurer's report: Treasurer Steve Coxhead reported that income in 2016 was \$668,820 or 104% of the projected budget while expenses were \$588,693 or 91% of the budget. Since salaries were 66% of the budget and because there were several staff vacancies in 2016 the income surplus is easily explained.

The 2017 budget as presented is again a balanced budget which totals \$643,221.

Audit Committee report: Terry Quinn presented the Audit report which had no issues of concern and just two recommendations for improved accountability. One recommendation was for more detail when making travel request approval and the other to consider additional credit cards issued to staff so that individual expenses could be tracked more easily.

The chair of the nominating committee, Charles Lansdowne, presented the slate of officers as follows: Elders – Class of 2020 Patty Dawes, Sue Harrison, Frank Berzinis, Merit Lemke, Kelly Rhodes. Youth Elder (one year term) Grace Iwachiw.

Deacons – Class of 2020 Betsy Cameron, Barb Flanigan, Vanessa Chapa, Sally Van Bokkelen, Susan Johns, Rebecca McCauley, Ruth Fauth, Doug Johnson, Renee Castro (two year term)

Nominating Committee – Robin Webber, Wendy Borbely, Janet Krieger, Jean Dixon. Alternates Donna

Williamson, John Karcher.

Pre-School Board – Renee Castro.

Auditor - Class of 2020 Terry Quinn (two year term), Jerry Pearson (three year term).

There was a motion to approve the slate of nominees. Motion carried.

The Corporation meeting closed at 6:40 p.m. at which time the congregation meeting reconvened.

President Douglas Williams reviewed the major accomplishments of WPC during 2016. The major points were the decision to call an assistant/associate pastor. The invitation Sundays during October. The Eric Estill memorial run and the Mission support which was generated. Forward planning to use small groups for growth of discipleship.

Pastor Quincy noted that we were a community founded in Christ and that our goals and vision remained consistently focused in Christ. He also praised the work of our volunteers which are exceptional. It was noted by a congregation member that the audit report had not been formally approved. A motion was made and seconded to approver the audit report. Motion passed.

The meeting closed with corporate prayer at 6:55 p.m.

Westminster Presbyterian Church, Munster, Indiana Minutes of the Congregation meeting April 30, 2017

Pastor Quincy A. Worthington opened the meeting with prayer at 11:55a.m. There was a quorum present. Session scheduled this special meeting for the purpose of considering a Call to Rev. Beau Brown for the position of Associate Pastor at Westminster Presbyterian Church, Munster Indiana.

Barb Robbins, chair of the APNC, reported for the APNC. After introducing Rev. Brown she recommended that WPC call Rev. Brown to fill the position of Associate Pastor.

Rev. Brown gave a brief review of his faith journey and described his wife and children. The floor was opened for questions from the congregation. John Castro asked why Rev. Brown was leaving his current church. Rev. Brown said that he wanted to focus on Youth Ministry and serve as staff rather than be head of staff in a smaller congregation.

The terms of call were presented. A compensation package which totaled \$68,425 that included health insurance and retirement was described. Responsibilities are to the Youth Program, Missions, and preaching once each month.

Laura Shields asked what his schedule would be like. Pam Ytri asked if he would preach once each month and if he would also do visitation. Darlene spoke to the need to "Do It Now". Pastor Quincy said he looked forward to having a colleague who shares his vision and has new ideas. Tim Sweeney asked if WPC would expand our offering of worship services.

There was a call of the question. There was unanimous approval to extend the call.

Pastor Brown closed the meeting with prayer.

Audit Committee Report – Year 2017 Issued January 28, 2018

2017 Financial Review:

- Federal and State tax withholdings Tax year 2017 W2 statements will be provided to all employees.
- Form 1099-Misc will be provided to all independent contractors that received \$600 or more in compensation.
- For tax year 2017 Form 941's have been or will be filed for each quarter.
- Tax withholdings have been paid to the proper Federal and State departments.
- Financial Reports, bank statements and checks have been reviewed and found to be in order.
- WPC Corporate Treasurer, Steve Coxhead, and Dawn DalSanto, Financial Secretary, have reviewed the Automated Clearing House (ACH) transactions for payroll and contributions throughout the year. Everything has been found to be in order.
- Financial and membership data continues to be backed-up on a weekly basis and stored off-site.
- Restricted accounts have been reviewed and found to be in order.
- The Financial Secretary continues to void outstanding checks over 90 days on June 30th and December 31st and return the amount of the checks to the General Fund.
- Review of the church credit cards, accountability of purchases, and payments to Bank of America have been reviewed each month and found to have no discrepancies. Every line item has a description of item and reason for purchase, and the monthly bill has proper signoffs. There are currently 4 credit cards issued to WPC.

Recommendations for 2018

• Session needs a more formalized written process in notifying the Financial Secretary of any adjustment in compensation to employees.

WPC's financial processes and procedures appear to be in order at this time. The Audit Committee would like to remind the Congregation this audit is actually a financial review and not a certified audit. A formal audit is expensive and found not to be required at this time. If in the future Session deems one is required, they can take the appropriate actions at that time.

Session Report 2017

Purpose and Responsibilities: The Session is composed of 16 Elders, fifteen elders are elected to that office, normally for a three year term, and one youth elder elected for a one year term. Session is responsible for governing Westminster Presbyterian Church with powers defined by *The Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A.* Elders serve as trustees of the corporation and have fiduciary responsibility for the business transactions of WPC.

Mission Statement: Westminster is a community where people of all ages are transformed by God's love to serve and grow as disciples of Jesus.

2017 Tasks and Accomplishments: There were three congregational meetings held during 2017. The annual meeting on January 22, 2017 reviewed church operations which had followed a balanced budget during 2016 and began a second year with a balanced budget in place. Session called a meeting on April 30 for the purpose of calling Rev. Beau Brown as Associate Pastor to fill the newly created position with responsibilities for Youth and Missions. Then Session called a meeting on October 26 to accept the resignation of Pastor Brown and dissolve the call as our Associate Pastor.

New member meetings were held in February and in August. Twenty three new members who joined WPC either by transfer of membership from another church or by affirmation of faith were added to our church family. Seven youth were accepted to membership and recognized on Confirmation Sunday.

Session organized and sponsored a "Block Party" which was very successful in supporting intergenerational activities. There were also many neighbors who joined in the festivities.

On July 23 the installation service for Rev. Beau Brown was celebrated with support throughout Wabash Valley Presbytery.

Each WPC Committee has a member of Session assigned to serve as liaison so that Session is informed and connected to all activities. Session also has fiduciary responsibility for the business affairs of WPC and meets monthly to review activities. Officers of the Corporation during 2016 were: President Douglas Williams, Vice President Mike Moses. Elected to serve as Treasurer was Steve Coxhead and as Clerk was Jim Yackel.

Session is responsible for the care and maintenance of our beautiful facilities. Our balanced operating budget however does not provide, on a yearly basis, funds needed to do more than routine housekeeping. To catch up on needed more costly items a capital campaign was included as part of the annual stewardship program. The next two years will see replacement of flooring throughout, new wall covering/painting and other facility face lifts.

Membership during the year 2017 began with 578 members, there were 30 members added by transfer or affirmation of faith and by confirmations of youth. During 2016, 11 members died and 4 moved their membership to another church. The year 2018 begins then with 593 members.

2017 Annual Report Building & Grounds

Our church campus is 5 acres, and our department staff maintains the building and grounds. The building services team consists of Robert Anselmo, Ray Anna, Michael Stewart and Brandon Hicks. The building services team operates 12 hours each day during the week and generally 6 hours on a Saturday and 8 hours on a Sunday. We are here more often and in greater number as events and projects dictate a necessity. The building services team performs the pre cleaning of meetings and event spaces. We also perform the set-up and tear-down of events and the clean-up after. In addition to the general meetings that are held here almost every day of the week, we have numerous large Westminster events. You can find our Google event calendar on our website at http://www.wpcmunster.org/CALENDAR_EVENTS. Our building is also utilized and rented by community members. Some of the events (Westminster and community) that were held here included: Christmas New Years and Easter services, Outdoor Worship, regular worship, Health and Healing Ministries, Christian education, youth group activities, Loaves and Fishes, Samaritan Center, Munster Moms, Moms time out, NA and Alcoholics Anonymous, the Easter egg hunt, family nights, children's musical, election day, Estill 5k Run, funerals, weddings, bridal showers, baby showers, Christenings, birthdays, Nordic Folk gathering, Hospice Memorial Service, Rummage Sale, VBS, Leader Dog training, Living Nativity and Marketplace, the Preschool holiday programs and open houses and blood drives.

The Building and Grounds department performs the majority of the repairs around the building that are minor in nature or within the scope of our expertise. A partial list is as follows, carpet cleaning, lightbulb changes, gutter cleaning, landscaping maintenance, miscellaneous plumbing and carpentry repairs, changing the event sign, doing laundry, washing dishes, taking down and putting away any stored items used by the church and painting just to name a few. We use licensed professionals for large repairs to our HVAC, plumbing, roofing. Additionally, office equipment, computers, phones, utilities, and supplies all fall under the building services umbrella.

There is a Building and Grounds Committee that meets on the first Monday of the month at 6:30pm in Room 106. Any members who are interested in attending are welcome to join us.

Here are some highlights from the year:

- We stopped using the fiberglass type and returned to using a pleated filter to catch more dust and airborne debris. This will also help to protect the air handler blower motor from additional wear do to grit passing through. You may also remember the black dust around the vents in fellowship hall, this will also remedy that from occurring. Some people may have concern that the pleated filter may restrict air flow however we are not using the 3M brand as they seem to be the most notorious for that problem. We also now do monthly checks of the furnaces and change filters in high traffic areas as needed.
- We have started locking all doors during the day and keeping only the front door open during school hours to add a measure of safety to the preschool children.
- We found new ways to decrease the cost of janitorial supplies by aggressively shopping around with different vendors. We also changed the paper hand towel dispensers that locked us into using only one supplier. This past year, by being an educated consumer we have saved the church over 4500.00 in janitorial supplies. Savings like this enabled us to purchase new items for the church like a new chair rack and the new towel dispensers. Items we now buy in bulk to save 50% of normal costs are: hand towels, cups, Kcups, toilet paper, cleaning products and office paper.
- We switched our Fire inspection service to Action Fire from Koorsen. Koorsen had bought all of their competitors in NW Indiana and with that were charging twice as much as previously. Koorsen's cost for inspection, testing and replacing unserviceable extinguishers was \$2037.14, Action Fire's cost was \$1032.00.

- We purchased a new gas powered edger and edged the 2400 ft of sidewalk around the church.
- Thursday before the Estill run we had a sewer line backup in the preschool hallway. Friday morning we
 rented a heavy duty drain cleaner for 65.00 and removed a blockage that appeared to be a rag or
 remnants of a diaper. We were able to clean the entire line under the preschool hall with the rented
 machine. All areas affected were sanitized and carpet cleaned.
- We purchased a new washer and dryer to replace both units that were not working properly or broken and saved over 1000 dollars between them both.
- We also purchased new Wifi thermostats. They were \$200 dollar models that we were able to get for \$67 dollars each. The new Wi-Fi thermostats have all been installed. They have all been connected to the church Wi-Fi for remote monitoring and programed for optimal savings during non-occupied room use times. Each night someone from the building department checks that they have not been put on hold and return all units to the scheduled program. We were also able to fine tune rooms such as Wednesday mornings to warm 209 from 6am to 11am and shut down after and fellowship hall between the hours of 8:45 and 9:30 where additional heat is needed to counter the front door use during preschool drop offs. The estimated savings from Honeywell is 100.00-150.00 monthly.
- We purchased and installed a VIZIO 50-Inch 4K Ultra HD Smart LED TV for room 106. This room is used for multiple meetings and Sunday school. The new TV connects to the Wi-Fi and laptops and videos can be watched directly from online sources without a laptop.

We will continue to be diligent about making the church welcoming and clean with the help of a great Building and Grounds team.

I welcome questions from anyone interested in learning more about what the Building and Grounds Team does in normal operation or any comments or concerns.

Annual Report 2018

A new couple with their child came to talk with me after WPC kids last week. They said when they drove up their son looked out the window and and screamed "Yay! I love this place!!" They said "So whatever you are doing here, keep it up! We think we have found the church we've been looking for."

It's been a busy, but also fulfilling and rewarding year. Comments like this assure me that all the effort is worthwhile. It is great to see how well we use our diverse gifts to serve this church, the community, and Jesus Christ. Westminster is a place that truly acts out its mission being a community where people of all ages are transformed by God's love to serve and grow as disciples of Jesus.

Here is a summary of our accomplishments in Christian Education, Family Ministry and Visual Arts Ministry:

WPC Kids

- Katie Boyle, the Superintendent of Sunday School and I created a three year cycle of lessons and stories for this age group 1st-5th Grade. This year, we covered topics and stories including, Baptism, Communion, Discipleship, Mission, The Miracles of Jesus, and Beatitudes, The story of David was our summer focus, Creation, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Rebecca and Jacob. During Lent we focused on Sharing the Journey, and during Advent, we explored the theme "See the Light" through the Stories surrounding the Birth of Christ and Epiphany. These lessons are all taught through a multiple intelligence approach using art, drama, storytelling, games, cooking, science, music and video. This approach allows us to modify our plans to engage our diverse and ever changing group of amazing kids. Thank you also Lynn Eplawy, Renee Castro, Julie Glavin, Marcy Smitka, Kathy Puchkors, and Dave Staniszeski who have been leaders and helpers this year.
- **WPC Kids Mission** We raised \$200 for **Fish and Loaves** ministry and celebrated with a cookies and ice cream party!
- The annual attendance average was 18 kids per week, and we have 58 kids on our roster who have attended throughout the year.
- We held our annual Bible Bowl, with Referee Nicole Nida on Feb 5th. This event helps the kids review all they have learned since September.
- Vacation Bible School was led by Kelly Rhodes with the Theme "Maker Fun Factory." We had 122 kids more than 50 volunteers that helped make this program a success.
- Children's worship bags with crayons and fidget items were created in September. These help children stay engaged during worship, and are really appreciated by the parents of small children.

Family Ministry

- A Family Bowling day was held at Stardust Bowl on April 8.
- We held our annual **Easter Egg Hunt** on April 15 with more than 125 people from outside the church who attended for the Easter activities and fun..

Annual Report – 2017

The Worship & Music Committee met the first Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. W&M included Pastor Quincy Worthington, Associate Pastor Brown, Verdeen Strain, Laura Shields, Jim Severa, Shari Le Monnier, Chris Gloff, David Shike, John Higley, Mike Moses, *Current* Advent Chairs, Bill and Christine Cangiano; and, Timothy Sweeney as Chair of W&M. Note Rev Beau Brown served from July 23 to November 26, 2017.

Our Purpose:

To provide meaning and continuity to the worship of the congregation To incorporate music and other arts as worship tools in our praise of God To plan a variety of worship and special events that inspire To incorporate "Minutes for Mission"

Accomplishments:

Elements of the service, (Water, the Bible, and Bread and Wine) continue to be brought forward and/or lifted by volunteers. This powerful unifying action begins each traditional service with a meditative "Taize" reminding us of our relationship to God.

Bulletin for traditional and contemporary was combined into a tri-folded 11 x 17. Designs by Jeff Whitney.

Times Services: Traditional started at 9:00 a.m. and Contemporary began at 10:45. No action was taken on a Saturday evening service as contemplated by W&M, staff, and session in 2016.

Ushers continued to greet and seat members, new and old every Sunday, Sunday reps provided age appropriate bulletins designed specifically for various children's needs. Usher schedules were posted in sacristy area behind Narthex.

Childrens' Chat existed at both services. Church Sunday school functioned around the shorter time in class with creative thematic design projects. The numbers of children in attendance has increased, decreased, fluctuated with the seasons.

Communion Process Our 9:00 a.m. service had a traditional communion process whereby trays of bread and juice were passed to seated congregants. Eight servers were recruited for each Communion Sunday. In the Contemporary Service, one or two "intinction" stations were used. Elements were taken to homebound each week. A Communion assignment list was posted in Narthex with an accompanying instruction/map. All youth from 5th grade through high school were invited into the sanctuary on Communion Sunday to observe the service and to receive the elements. Communion elements were no longer delivered to the Sunday school instructors as per their request.

Lent Events began with our Ash Wednesday Service on March 1st service was well attended and supported by music and scripture readings as a time for meditation and prayer. Each participant received the mark of the cross with ashes and oil to remind them of rebirth.

Palm Sunday, April 9, was heavily attended and each person received a palm branch from a child as they entered. After the opening procession by the children, all others integrated the waving of palms into the service.

Maundy Thursday, April 13, was a soup dinner followed by a service w/ Communion by intinction and sacred music sung by the choir.

On **Good Friday**, April 14, at 12:00 noon in Fellowship Hall, Story -Teller Meagan recounted the ancient Good Friday events through the eyes of Mary Magdelen. An 8:00 p.m. Traditional Service in the sanctuary was subdued and the cross draped in black and purple as moving choral and instrumental works and sacred texts were performed.

On April 15, for a second year, "Sadder Day, A Blues Service" was performed. It explored the feeling of hopelessness, loss and sorrow that the followers of Jesus were going through after losing their mentor and friend. This years event was heavily attended and very moving spiritually. I hope this service led by Jeff Whitney and Chris Gloff becomes a tradition.

On April 16th our Easter theme focused on the Ascension of Christ, The designs were breathtaking and quite spiritual. The Sanctuary was filled with real lilies in wall baskets and across the floor, and, the Cross was draped in white satins. The Hallelujah Chorus was sung. It was a wonderfully attended celebration of the risen Christ.

April 23rd was designated **Earth Sunday**. The journey to Guatemala by the Water Reclamation Team was once again celebrated.

Confirmation/Pentecost Sunday, May 21st also included special thanks to all volunteers.

On June 4 Senior Sunday service was led by the H.S. Seniors. The service has a large attendance.

The Outdoor Service, July 2nd, designed and led by John Higley, and Pastor Quincy Worthington, featured a return of the Bourbon Aristocracy Band. After the service, guests gathered around the pie and ice cream tent, and, as in years past, the attendance was heavy. The weather was great and so was the pie and ice cream social. It was a wonderful time to share beyond our walls. This service integrated the Religious Reformation spirit of our nation as inspired by Martin Luther. Invitation were sent to the nearby neighbors to join us for music and pie and ice-cream.

Dedication of New Hymnals, September 17, Service paid tribute to the Bell Choir, Instrumentalist, and choir.

Advent Chairs, Bill and Christine Cangiano served as leaders from Sept.1 until Epiphany Sunday. They and Pastor Q. chose the theme "Light of the World". Sermons were based on the four pillars of faith. Coordinating with Bill and Christine Cangiano, Shari LeMonnier designed four walls of beautiful acrylic forms to reflect light and colorful shadows. WESTMINSTER PRESCHOOL 2017 ANNUAL REPORT

Westminster Preschool remains a vibrant and active part of our church. While preschool is a place of fun, it is also serious business. This continues to be our daily charge. The health and welfare of the children who are entrusted to us is our priority. We are working hard to help our students reach their developmental milestones. We have policies and procedures in place to support security needs and overall wellness. We are supporting and educating parents who have concerns and stresses. We are striving to create a community that our students and parents enjoy. It takes a lot of time and energy from many individuals to make sure the school is operating smoothly from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. five days a week from September through May.

In addition to working hard to maintain our daily operations, the preschool accomplished a few goals this past year. First and foremost, we had a successful registration for this current school year. Our Fab Five and Panda Bear programs were at full capacity for the first time in many years. We started the school year with a handful of openings in the afternoon Teddy Bear classes but these classes are hard to fill since not all parents send their children to preschool at age 3 and if they do, afternoon classes are not desirable because of naps. A lot of energy was put into renovating the playground this past summer. I would not have accomplished this project without the help of my family. Boy Scout Troop 533, under the direction of Eagle Scout candidate Ben Shelton, removed the pea gravel, leveled the ground, installed two new pieces of equipment and moved in rubber mulch. We also improved upon our assessment process after having updated curriculum in place for the second year. And our staff continues to be dedicated to professional development by attending a conference in Oak Park each August. One change we had within the classrooms this year was the absence of long time teacher Debby Flahaven who took a family leave for the year. Fortunately, another one of our teachers was able to take on Debby's class for this year.

The preschool continues to be **financially independent** of the church's operating fund and we maintain a savings that allows for **financial stability**. Our monthly tuition covers staff payroll and program needs. The preschool collects a registration fee from families at the start of

each school year and that money is turned over to the church's operating fund (just under \$8,000) to help with overhead costs such as lights, heat, custodial services. Church members do not need to pay the registration fee since they contribute to the operating fund. They do pay full tuition however.

I'd also like to note that our staff continues to work on bringing the Westminster Preschool families into our church community. We distribute flyers/invitations for church programs. I continue to serve as Pageant Director so that preschool families may feel at ease participating in this Christmas Eve service. The preschool also sponsored the Cookie Booth at the Bethlehem Marketplace. We support several Westminster missions - coat and hat collections for Sojourner Truth House, salad dressing for Loaves and Fishes and contributions to the Rummage Sale. I have invited church staff members to share their talents with the preschoolers as well. Shari did a clay ornament making workshop with our three year olds. Verdeen played the piano and Jeff helped with sound and lighting for our holiday programs. Jeff has also kept our information for the website current and re-did an advertisement for me this year. Gina and her phone volunteers always provide a cheery hello to the families as they enter the building and Robert and his staff support staff as we work to meet the needs of the school. Dawn continues to be efficient in our bookkeeping and payroll needs. Several congregation members have also been giving of their time. Preschool Advisory Board members continue to be dedicated with monthly meetings where their education expertise and financial guidance is much appreciated. Ed Harrison provided a "missions" lesson explaining the Loaves and Fishes ministry to our classrooms. Lastly, the preschool works cooperatively with Peggy Ogren and Patti Gibbs of Mom's Time Out.

We will continue to strive to maintain our excellent reputation in the community and keep our classrooms full, benefiting the church as well as the families who honor us with their business. May God continue to bless the work we are doing in and for our community.

The youth planning team was put together in 2013 after the death of Dan LeMonnier. The group was under the direction of Jim Dixon until the hiring of Annie Peterson as Youth Director in June of 2015. Annie continued to keep the group together as we were a good sounding board and provided extra support and helping hands for the youth events. After Annie's departure in December of 2016, the group continued to meet each month to plan, coordinate and oversee activities for our Westminster Youth and their friends. We were pleased to have the church dedicate the Associate Pastor position to lead the youth team volunteers and be a new spiritual leader for the youth. We welcomed Beau Brown with open arms in June of 2017.

Beau's work with the youth started slow as our youth are very spread thin throughout the summer months with sports, summer camps and family vacations. He hosted "Lunch with Beau's" once a week throughout July but only had the same 2-3 kids each week. Sunday school was conducted by Tricia and Brett Shelton until August 1 to allow Beau time to be involved in worship but he did attend a few times to start to get to know the youth and see how the programming went. The second annual Whihala Beach service as well as the annual car wash and a back to school youth night were organized by volunteers in August allowing for Beau to be introduced to more of the youth as well as see how things are handled. Our group then took a back seat trying to allow Beau opportunity for leadership. Besides the youth helping with the spaghetti lunch for the Eric Estill 5K Walk/Run and Wednesday and Thursday night volleyball starting in November, not much other activity was planned for the youth. Even Sunday morning programming fall by the wayside as Beau did not seem to be available on Sunday mornings.

With Beau's departure in December 2017, the youth team re-grouped under the direction of David Lemke. Bill Cangiano stepped up to oversee the budget and check requests. Nicole Nita is serving as the group secretary and handles communications. The few events already on the calendar were picked up/coordinated and supervised by different members of the committee – such as serving soup at Living Nativity and enjoying a Christmas Party and bowling fellowship over Christmas Break. Volleyball was already in place with experienced coaches. Dave Lemke, Dave Dawes, Bill Cangiano and Bridgette Speranza continue to coach the high school volleyball program. We asked Jacob Opat and Marcello Urbaniwicz (volleyball alumni) to join the youth team and both stepped up to help Mike Pawlicki with the middle school volleyball program.

The youth team is dedicated to continuing the success of the volleyball program, re-instating Sunday Morning Programming, hosting more fellowship events (a winter party is planned for February) and offering mission opportunities to our youth, including the summer mission trip. Our youth have been resilient during all the changes and many have developed wonderful relationships with the many adults who have been the constant for their programming over the past few years. However, the program can be improved and expanded if the youth had a dedicated staff member. We will continue to serve our youth to the best of our abilities but look forward to welcoming a new youth director.

2017 Annual Report - Deacons

Other duties include, leading the people in worship through prayers of intercession, reading the Scriptures, presenting the gifts of the people, and assisting with the Lord's Supper.

Organizationally, the WPC Board of Deacons is led by a Moderator and consists of 24 members, each serving a 3-year term with eight deacons being replaced annually. In broad terms, our Deacons serve the church *compassionately* in a number of ways.

Requirements for deacons consist of:

- Attend a monthly meeting on the 3rd Tuesday of the month (no meetings July or August)
- Correspondence with zone members when necessary
- Sign up for a Ministry team which fits their strengths (see below) and help perform duties as necessary.
- Serve coffee during fellowship time every 8 weeks
- Assist with funeral luncheons by providing food or helping serve/set up

Deacon Ministry Teams:

- 1. **Congregational Care -** Sending cards, making phone calls and even an occasional visit to members who are sick, in the hospital or just need some prayers.
- Adopt-A-Family Our annual mission project which takes place at Christmastime. 2017
 was another successful year and we provided gifts to almost 30 people in need from six
 families.
- 3. **Bereavement Luncheons** help coordinate luncheons for families typically on Saturdays. There were seven luncheons we provided food and service for in 2017
- 4. **Fellowship / Coffee -** Coordinating the fellowship hour in between services.
- 5. **New Initiatives -** Serves as "Think tank" to discuss/flesh out new ideas and present recommendations to full deacons group for discussion. We helped coordinate member sign ups to take pictures for the new church directory, which was a HUGE job and would not have been accomplished without the help of all deacons!

Annual Report 2017- The Mission Team-Amy Franklin

The Mission Team coordinated many events and supported a variety of causes during 2017. Included are the highlights from each of our groups and where our support went this year.

Loaves & Fishes-a new stove has been added and are cooking more than ever! Some of the churches who are part of the ones who cook have had to stop or reduce the meals they are covering and WPC has picked up the extra days. We are currently feeding 40 for lunch and 80-100 at night. Luckily, donations have increased!

Habitat for Humanity-we accomplished a fantastic church wide panel build that included us paying for all the supplies in our parking lot with approximately 30 volunteers along with lunch being prepared and served by volunteers. Additionally, we held 2 other build site volunteer days with small volunteer groups at locations in Gary and Lowell.

Mission Marketplace-has been selecting wonderful new items and really improving their display! They have had a great year!

Heart for Africa-security has been a struggle for them this year, they are looking for ways to improve. During the year, they have "baby showers" that people can shop and send to them by using/ordering on amazon. We supported them this way and donate directly when they were having a matching by a donor.

Living Waters-WPC participated in two mission trips to Guatemala this year with Living Water World Missions. Jerry Pearson was on the team in April. Christina and Grace Iwachiw and Mike and Mary Pawlicki went in June. Additionally we purchased the water filtration system installed on the June trip. Also held a donation drive for the bottles and collected \$2050 which was matched and will provide 500 5gal bottles for the people of Guatemala.

The Eric Estill Memorial 5K & Pasta Lunch held on 10/21/17 raised over \$15,000.00. Support will be distributed to Westminster Kid's and Youth Programs, WPC Vacation Bible School, WPC Pre-School, Westminster Music Ministry, Lake Central Dollars for Scholars, Eternal Valor Foundation - Munster & Samaritan Counseling Center- Munster.

Loving Hands-They have crafted scarves, hats, lap robes, capes, socks, mittens, prayer shawl, lap gowns, chicken sweater(yes for a chicken!), potholders, scrubbers, dishtowels, and headbands. These items were given to local shelters, nursing homes, schools, church, homeless, and veterans.

Every year, the Salvation Army Rehab Center in Gary asks us to help provide the men in the center receive a Christmas gift. The past couple of years have been Hats & Gloves that we ask for sponsorship, we are able to give 100 sets!

Hurricane Harvey Collection an unexpected disaster that had a remarkable outpouring of critically needed items collected in just a few short weeks after Hurricane Maria hit Puerto Rico

the Mission team allocated \$1000.00 for goods to be sent to an organization working with the FEMA pipeline to distribute the supplies to the island.

We gave donations to Men's and Women's Kairos, Healing Faith, Eternal Valor, Christmas Joy Special Offering, Kemmerer Village, Shirley Heinz, Sojourner Truth, St. Monica Home, Nazareth Home, Malawi Matters, and Clearlake Church, TX to help feed volunteers with hurricane cleanup. For the City Rescue Men's, we wanted them to receive a Christmas gift and sent them hats & gloves!

Caps and Lids Collection

The "Caps and Lids Collection" is a project designed to keep non-recyclable plastics out of landfills while providing parks, school, and non-profit organizations with useful, durable, and pleasant-looking park benches.

The types of caps and lids being collected include clean

- Snap-On cottage cheese, coffee can, and yogurt lids
- Twist-on medicine, drink, and milk bottles, including the ring
- Flip-top ketchup and condiment bottles
- Large twist-off lids (such as detergent)
- Spout lids (such as squirt mustard)

Unusable are the flimsy lids for fast-food soft-drink cups as well as any items made fully or partially of metal including:

- Apple sauce lids that have a metal lid surrounded by plastic
- Squeeze-trigger spray lids that have a steel spring inside
- Stay-tabs or flip-tops from beverage cans.

Not useful are plastic items that are not caps or lids.

This project grew out of an earlier Westminster Pre-school project in which the collection of these non-recyclable plastics that resulted in the bench in the pre-school's playground.

Members are encouraged not to put these materials into the trash, but rather to bring them to church and either give them directly to Ken or Peg Schoon or to leave them in the collection area near the entrance to South Hall. All donated caps and lids are removed weekly from the church and stored at home until they can be taken to the Dunes Learning Center at the Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore. Then, when 400 pounds of caps and lids have been received, volunteers from the Pines Village Retirement Home in Valparaiso load them on a truck and take them to Green Tree Plastics in Evansville, Indiana, where they are melted down and formed into a park bench.

The benches are then brought back to the Learning Center where they easily withstand northwest Indiana's weather.

There are no financial costs to WPC for this project.
