## Westminster Presbyterian Church, Munster, Indiana Minutes of the Congregation meeting January 24, 2016

The meeting was called to order in the Sanctuary at 6:15 p.m. by Moderator Quincy A. Worthington. Pastor Quincy opened the meeting with a prayer. A quorum was present. Clerk Jim Yackel offered a tribute to those members who died during 2015.

The chair of the nominating committee, Charles Lansdowne, presented the slate of officers as follows:

There was a motion to close nominations. Jim McNabny moved approval of the slate of nominees. Motion carried.

The meeting recessed at 6:25 p.m. and the Corporation meeting convened. Minutes of the 2015 annual meeting were approved.

President Jerry Iwachiw reported that the Terms of Call for Pastor Worthington would remain unchanged for 2016.

Treasurer's report: Treasurer Steve Coxhead reported that income in 2015 was 99 percent of budget, expenses were 102 percent of budget, but the 2015 budget had been a deficit budget. For 2016 the Session has adopted a balanced budget which is \$70,000 less than the 2015 budget. To achieve a balanced budget there were reductions in staff positions from full to part time. Questions were raised about how decisions had been made concerning these staff reductions

There was a motion to approve the Treasurer's report. Motion carried.

Jim Tufford presented the Audit Report which was moved for approval and accepted. The Corporation meeting closed at 8:00 p.m. at which time the congregation meeting reconvened.

Elder Nancy Quinn presented the By-Laws which been edited and revised. There was a motion to approve the revised By-Laws. Motion was unanimously approved.

The meeting adjourned with pray at 8:10 p.m.

## Westminster Presbyterian Church, Munster, Indiana Minutes of the Congregation meeting September 25, 2016

The meeting was called to order with prayer by Pastor Quincy A. Worthington. There was a quorum present.

The first order of business was to fill a vacancy on the Board of Deacons. The Nominating Committee presented Jim Lamont to fill this position, there were no nominations from the floor. Jim Lamont was elected by voice vote.

The second order of business was to consider a recommendation from Session to create another pastoral position of Assistant/Associate Pastor. President Douglas Williams presented the recommendation and reviewed the recent history of Session's study of the WPC staffing needs and recommendations from a Task Force formed to study the future staffing needs of WPC.

There followed a comment/question period during which questions of financial viability, congregation growth and need for a pastoral position were discussed. Following the discussion, Ron Robbins moved approval of the Session recommendation to create a new pastoral position. There were several voices offering a second to the motion.

Treasurer Coxhead spoke to the need to keep salary commitments in line with the total budget and suggested a salary cap may be needed. Lorrie Dorn spoke to the need to support our church and to keep programs strong.

Paper ballots were distributed to everyone present. There were 74 ballots cast with 58 yes votes and 16 no votes .

There was then a slate of nominees presented to form a PNC to conduct a search to fill the position of Assistant/Associate Pastor. The Nominating Committee's slate were: Natalie Cangiano, Dave Dawes, Sandy Kauffman, David Lemke, Barbara Robbins, Anna Severa, Barbara Terpstra, Marcello Urbanowicz, and Ann Williams with alternate members Diana Hart, Holly McCain, Jeff Whitney.

There were no nominations from the floor and the slate presented by the Nominating Committee was elected by voice vote.

The meeting closed with prayer by Pastor Quincy at 4:50p.m.

# Annual Report of the Treasurer January 2017

Financially, 2016 was a good year for Westminster. We closed the year showing an operating gain of \$80,127. By comparison, 2015 ended with an operating loss of \$40,776, and 2014 ended with an operating loss of \$30,766. So, we have done somewhat better than break even for the period 2014 thru 2016. This is due to a number of factors. Giving was solid throughout 2016. At the beginning of the year, your Session adopted a break even budget for the year, to guide spending and staffing decisions. Finally, we did not employ a full time youth director during the year, and we lost our full time building manager half way through the year. For the last quarter of the year, we have managed to hold cash equivalent to three months operations in the operating fund. So, we have ended the year on a solid note.

Planned operating revenue for 2016 was \$645,725. We actually achieved 104% of that target. Operating expenses were likewise planned to be \$645,725. We actually incurred only 91% of planned expenses. Hence, the operating gain.

However, we still must be vigilant and actively manage our finances to accomplish our goals. Going forward into 2017, your Session has again produced a balanced budget, with projected expenses coming in under projected revenues. The 2017 budget includes the expense of an associate pastor for roughly half a year. The 2018 budget must include that additional expense for a full year.

To carry on the business of the Church in 2016 required \$588,693 in operating funds, as well as \$260,898 from various restricted funds. It cost \$144,585 to operate the preschool. Please note that the preschool generates revenue in excess of it's expenses, so as not to require support from the operating budget. This gives a total cost to operate Westminster of \$994,176 for the year 2016.

The Church's income consists almost entirely of donations by individuals. We do not have significant business or investment income. We did recently receive a bequest from the estate of the late Jack Dietrich in the amount of \$299,138. That amount is currently being held as a balance sheet asset (separate from the operating fund) until Session completes its' determination as to the most appropriate way to make use of the bequest.

So, where did the money go?

In 2016, operating expenses were distributed as follows:

1.	Staff Salaries & Expenses	66%
2.	Building & Grounds	18%
3.	Office & Misc.	7%
4.	Mission	5%
5.	Worship & Music	2%

# Audit Committee Report – Year 2016 Issued January 2017

### 2016 Financial Review:

- Federal and State tax withholdings Tax year 2015 W2 statements have been provided to all employees.
- Form 1099-Misc has been provided to all independent contractors that received \$600 or more in compensation.
- For tax year 2016 Form 941's have been or will be filed (4<sup>th</sup> Qtr. 2016 yet to be filed) for each quarter.
- Tax withholdings have been paid to the proper Federal and State departments.
- Financial Reports, bank statements and checks have been reviewed and found to be in order.
- WPC Corporate Treasurer, Steve Coxhead, has reviewed the Automated Clearing House (ACH) transactions for payroll and contributions throughout the year. Everything has been found to be in order.
- The Counting Committee continues to strive for more members to assist in the Sunday counting process. A marked improvement has been made to assure a husband/wife team is only considered as one of the two parties required for the counting process. In the rare occurrence when a second party was not available, the counting was deferred until Monday when a second party became available.
- Financial and membership data continues to be backed-up on a weekly basis and stored offsite.
- Currently there is no documented disaster recovery procedure(s) for the office computer equipment, routers, and other network support equipment. Quincy has been presented this information and will work with Session to address the issue.
- Restricted accounts have been reviewed and found to be in order.
- The Financial Secretary continues to void outstanding checks over 90 days on June 30<sup>th</sup> and December 31<sup>st</sup> and return the amount of the checks to the General Fund.
- Mileage reimbursement was paid using the 2016 Federal guideline of \$0.54 per mile, down from the 2015 rate of \$0.575. Note: The 2017 published rate will be paid at \$0.535.

- Review of the church credit cards, accountability of purchases, and payments to Bank of America have been reviewed each month and found to have no discrepancies. Every line item has a description of item and reason for purchase, and the monthly bill has proper signoffs.
- Currently WPC has two credit cards. One issued to Trish Shelton for Preschool and the other to Gina Nida for church supplies and other approved purchases.

### Recommendations for 2017

- When presenting to Session travel requests, such as conferences and education, include detailed estimates of costs. Include items such as conference cost, travel, estimated meals, lodging, and other essentials.
- Session Finance Committee review credit card needs and determine if more than two issued cards would be helpful in maintaining individual accountability.

The Audit Committee would like to extend their sincere thanks to Dawn DalSanto (Financial Secretary), Steve Coxhead (WPC Corporate Treasurer), and Dale Zuck (Session Finance Committee Chairperson) for their timely and important help to the Audit Committee. They are to be commended for the fine job they do in their respected areas.

WPC's financial processes and procedures appear to be in order at this time. The Audit Committee would like to remind the Congregation this audit is actually a financial review as none of the members are Certified Public Accounts. A formal audit is extremely expensive and found not to be required at this time. If in the future Session deems one is required, they can take the appropriate actions at that time.

The Audit Committee thanks the Congregation for the opportunity to assist in serving Westminster Presbyterian Church.

### **Session Report 2016**

**Purpose and Responsibilities**: The Session is composed of Elders who are elected to that office, normally for a three year term, they are responsible for governing Westminster Presbyterian Church with powers defined by *The Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A.* Elders serve as trustees of the corporation and have fiduciary responsibility for the business transactions of WPC.

**Mission Statement:** Westminster is a community where people of all ages are transformed by God's love to serve and grow as disciples of Jesus.

### 2016 Tasks and Accomplishments:

Held the Annual Meeting January 22, 2015 to elect officers and to inform the congregation of the of the current state of affairs of WPC. Session adopted a balanced budget for 2016. To achieve a balanced budget several staff positions were reduced from full time positions to part time status. On September 25 a meeting of the congregation was held for the purpose of presenting a recommendation from Session to create an Assistant/Associate Pastor position. The recommendation was adopted and a Pastoral Nominating Committee was elected.

New member meetings were held in January and in August resulting in twelve new members who joined WPC either by transfer of membership or by affirmation of faith. Five youth were accepted to membership and recognized on Confirmation Sunday.

Each Committee has a member of Session assigned to serve as liaison so that Session is informed and connected to all activities. Session also has fiduciary responsibility for the business affairs of WPC and meets monthly to review activities. Officers of the Corporation during 2016 were: President Douglas Williams, Vice President Mike Moses. Elected to serve as Treasurer was Steve Coxhead and as Clerk was Jim Yackel.

Several small groups were established and met during the Summer months. Each group was organized by one or more Session members and evaluated on the basis of interest and effectiveness in meeting the spiritual interests of the congregation.

Invitation Sunday was sponsored by Session and coordinated with a three week sermon series. Everyone was encouraged to bring a friend to church.

Membership during the year 2016 began with 573 members, there were 17 members added by transfer or affirmation of faith. During 2016, 8 members died and 4 moved their membership to another church. The year 2017 begins then with 578 members.

# 2016 Annual Deacons Report

### **Purpose and Responsibilities**

In broad terms, Deacons serve the church *compassionately* in the following two roles:

- 1) Volunteer Workers: This role is generally quite structured and task oriented.
  - a) Preparing and serving coffee between services.
  - b) Hosting bereavement/memorial meals.
  - c) Leading the Adopt-A-Family program.
  - d) Helping with various special events.
- 2) Zone Leaders: This role is significantly less structured than the Volunteer Worker role, but it is equally important to our church. Each Deacon is charged with maintaining contact with a subgroup of the congregation known as a zone. By building strong relationships within a zone, Deacons help improve the interconnectedness of the entire church as these relationships mature and spread in/among the zones. Consequently Deacons try to have regular contact with their zone members through a variety of means such as:
  - a) Meet & Greet Sundays
  - b) Routine and special event correspondence
  - c) Visitation, etc.

Organizationally, the Board of Deacons is led by the Moderator and has the following eight committees, each comprised of a 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> year Deacon:

- 1) **Adopt-A-Family:** Coordinates the Adopt-A-Family Christmas gift purchase and delivery each year.
- 2) **Bereavement:** In conjunction with Robin Webber and Wendy Borbely, coordinates the set-up, serving, and clean-up efforts for memorial meals held at the church.
- 3) **Coffee Service:** Creates the master list for Sunday Coffee service, and handles various issues as they arise.
- 4) **Congregational Care:** Coordinates with Darlene and serves as a liaison to the congregational care group and the Deacons.
- 5) **Meet & Greet:** Coordinates the Deacon Meet & Greet program.
- 6) **Zone Assignment & Maintenance:** Coordinates the assignment and maintenance of the zone information for each deacon.
- Archives & Communication: Takes minutes at the deacons meetings, maintains zone correspondence templates, suggests periodic zone communiqués, etc.
- 8) **New Initiatives:** Serves as a "Think Tank" to discuss/flesh out new ideas and present recommendations to full deacon group for discussion.

We reinvested some funds for upgrades in the building (child safe, updated blinds in the three preschool classrooms and nursery, new shelves in the storage closet off of South Hall [done as an Eagle Scout project by Logan Rhodes] and new sinks for one of restrooms.) We postponed renovations of the playground as we sought to put more funds aside in order to complete a full overhaul of the space. We are now collecting quotes for new ground covering as well as several new playground pieces. We continued to improve upon our curriculum by formally aligning it with "Foundations" - the common core curriculum for preschools. We have refined our special events and field trips to make sure they have educational purpose and our staff continues to be dedicated to professional development by attending several workshops each year. We also reexamined our procedures for multiple types of emergency procedures. After consulting with the town's resource officer, we adopted the Lockdown/Lockout/ Evacuate/ Shelter protocol used in public schools across the state of Indiana. Training and the investment in / use of radios added a new safety measure for our school at the start of the school year this past Fall.

The merger of the preschool under the church's structure took place two years ago, but the preschool continues to be **financially independent** of the church's operating fund. Our monthly tuition covers staff payroll to program needs. The preschool collects a registration fee from families at the start of each school year and that money is turned over to the church's operating fund (typically about \$8,000) to help with overhead costs such as lights, heat, custodial services. We pay for any maintenance beyond custodian services as well as for use of the large copy machine.

I'd also like to note that our staff continues to work on bringing the Westminster Preschool families into our church community. We distribute flyers/invitations for church programs. I continue to serve as Pageant Director so that preschool families may feel at ease participating in this Christmas Eve service. The preschool also sponsored the Cookie Booth at the Bethlehem Marketplace. We support several Westminster missions coat and hat collections for Sojourner Truth House, salad dressing for Loaves and Fishes ministry and hygiene products for Greater Hammond Community Services. I have invited church staff members to share their talents with the preschoolers as well. Shari has done several art workshops, Verdeen played the piano and Jeff helped with sound and lighting for our holiday programs. Gina and her phone volunteers always provide a cheery hello to the families as they enter the building and the building managers and their staff have all supported our staff as we work to meet the needs of the school. Several congregation members have also been giving of their time. Board members Sara Sweeney, Julie Glavin and Kelly Rhodes have been extremely dedicated with monthly meetings where their education expertise has provided valuable advice and guidance. Brad Fuhs has served as our session liaison and his financial guidance is much appreciated. Steve Coxhead continues to receive and provide me with weekly reports on our credit card tuition payments and Dawn continues to be efficient in our bookkeeping. Ed Harrison provided several "missions" lessons explaining the Loaves and Fishes ministry to our classroom. Lastly, the preschool works cooperatively with Peggy Ogren and Patti Gibbs of Mom's Time Out.

Lastly, our goals for 2017 include the playground project as well as replacing carpet in the classrooms. We are also working on adding some additional "substitute" teachers to our staff. We will continue to strive to maintain our excellent reputation in the community and keep our classrooms full, benefiting the church as well as the families who honor us with their business.

May God continue to bless the work we are doing in and for our community.

# WESTMINSTER YOUTH ANNUAL REPORT 2016

Without a dedicated staff member overseeing our youth programming, a team of volunteers continued to meet each month to plan, coordinate and oversee activities for our Westminster Youth and their friends. Priorities this past year included maintaining the strength of the volleyball program, continuing with Sunday morning educational programming, mission opportunities as well as providing fellowship events.

Volleyball: Our middle school volleyball team continues to meet weekly and is coached by John Dorn and Mike Pawlicki. Nicole Nita or Susan Radovich provide supervision and snacks each week. High School continues to be blessed to have enough players for two teams. Bill Cangiano, David Lemke, Dave Dawes and Bridgette Parker-Speranza coach these teams weekly. David Lemke oversees devotions and different parents provide a meal each week. At the end of last season, a new award was dedicated in honor of Dale Fieldhouse, who prior to his passing, had led the volleyball league for many years. David Lemke now coordinates the league for the handful of area churches who participate in this opportunity for our youth. Westminster and South Side Christian Church continue to host the games each January through March.

Sunday Morning Programming: Tricia Shelton has overseen the educational programming for Sunday mornings since last January. Curriculum used throughout the spring was SPARK; Ancestors. The focus for the youth was learning about biblical figures who were used by God for good despite faults, insecurities or circumstances. Over the summer, both the middle school and high school groups met together and explored different devotional topics. The summer ended with over 30 youth and parents attending a Sunday morning beach worship service at Wihala Beach in Whiting. This fall, the groups have separated back out into their respective age groups and Julie Whitney has taught the Middle School group with help from Christine Cangiano, Michelle Pedrick and Susan Rodovich. Tricia and Brett Shelton meet with the High School group. The curriculum this Fall (which will continue until May) has been SPARK: Essential Questions. Each week another important question within our faith is explored.

Mission Opportunities: A handful of youth were able to participate in a Mission Trip this past summer to West Virginia. Jim Dixon, Bill Cangiano and Susan Radovich were instrumental in making that happen. Other opportunities have been overseen by Nicole Nita with serving pancakes at the Eric Estill Run as well as helping with soup at the Living Nativity. Several youth also participated in the family ministry fall kick off by submitting chili and cupcake entries for the event under the chili making leadership of Glenn Rhodes and the baking leadership of Janet Simkins.

Fellowship Activities: Events such as Sunday Night Game Nights, Ice Skating and Friday Night Youth Nights have continued to be planned and draw groups of over 25 kids. The annual ski trip was overseen by Glenn and Kelly Rhodes (who will again be in charge this upcoming week) and the Middle School group began a new tradition of Wisconsin Dells Waterpark trip which was chaperoned by Jim Dixon, Karen Comstock and Tricia Shelton last winter. Plans for this year's trip are currently being coordinated.

We have more planned for the upcoming year and welcome more congregational involvement while we await the arrival of a dedicated staff member to oversee youth activities.



### 2016 Annual Report

Life here at Westminster is a patchwork quilt of a constant frenzy of events. Never a dull moment really does not cover the scope or magnitude of all that goes on here in one calendar year. As the new building and Grounds supervisor I really appreciate the opportunity to be back and a part of this amazing ministry. My first two months have been eye opening as to the great scope of stewardship this position holds. I look forward to saving the church money wherever we can so that those resources can be put to use in teaching and proclaiming the Gospel to the flock and helping the needy in our many outreaches.

Our church campus is 5 acres, and our department staff maintains the building and grounds. The building services team consists of Robert Anselmo, Ray Anna, Michael Stewart and Camille Jancosek. The building services team operates 12 hours each day during the week and generally 6 hours on a Saturday and 8 hours on a Sunday. We are here more often and in greater number as events and projects dictate a necessity. The building services team performs the pre cleaning of meetings and event spaces. We also perform the set-up and teardown of events and the clean-up after. In addition to the general meetings that are held here almost every day of the week, we have numerous large Westminster events. You can find our Google event calendar on our website at http://www.wpcmunster.org/CALENDAR\_EVENTS. Our building is also utilized and rented by community members. Some of the events (Westminster and community) that were held here included: Christmas New Years and Easter services, Outdoor Worship, regular worship, Health and Healing Ministries, Christian education, youth group activities, Loaves and Fishes, Samaritan Center, Munster Moms, Moms time out, NA and Alcoholics Anonymous, the Easter egg hunt, family nights, children's musical, election day, Estill 5k Run, funerals, weddings, bridal showers, baby showers, Christenings, birthdays, Nordik Folk gathering, Hospice Memorial Service, Rummage Sale, VBS, Leader Dog training, Living Nativity and Marketplace, the Preschool holiday programs and open houses, blood drives and the annual meeting.

The Building and Grounds department performs the majority of the repairs around the building that are minor in nature or within the scope of our expertise. A partial list is as follows, carpet cleaning, lightbulb changes, gutter cleaning, landscaping maintenance, miscellaneous plumbing and carpentry repairs, changing the event sign, doing laundry, washing dishes, taking down and putting away any stored items used by the church and painting just to name a few. We use licensed professionals for large repairs to our HVAC, plumbing, roofing. Additionally, office equipment, computers, phones, utilities, and supplies all fall under the building services umbrella.

Throughout the different seasons, the building team adjusts the tasks to fit the needs of the church. During the summer months we perform the majority of outdoor grounds maintenance, including; mowing the lawn, edging, trimming, weeding, and shrub trimming. We wash windows and detail clean rooms in August to prepare for the start of the school year. During the fall, our building usage ramps up with the start of school and all the programming, and we have many people coming through our doors. The grounds maintenance during the fall encompasses mowing, perennial cutbacks and leaf gathering, along with preparing equipment and the building for the winter. During the winter months, we concentrate on indoor projects and maintain the church during the busy Advent and Lent seasons. In the spring we get the grounds tidied after the winter and perform spring clean-up.

This year during the Christmas time detail cleaning, with the help of Camille, we were able to clean all the walls in Fellowship hall. We cleaned around all the vents to remove the blacked dust and then washed off all the dis colored wallpaper paste. Many were very pleased with the end results as were we.

There is a Building and Grounds Committee that meets on the first Monday of the month at 6:30pm in Room 106. Any members who are interested in attending are welcome to join us.

#### **Grounds Maintenance:**

There were a few dead trees around the grounds which were cut down this year by volunteers. Building and Grounds performs most of the branch trimming and we call a tree service for the large and high branches.

Community Hospital continues to maintain the snow removal for the church and parking lot repairs.

We continue to recycle paper, plastics, aluminum, steel, lightbulbs, and batteries. We have also found a new company to recycle our 4' fluorescent bulbs which saves the church money. We had previously been paying

#### Fire/Life Safety:

October is Fire Safety month and this is when we have two days of fire drills. This year with our Building Manager interim, Jim Severa, he helped the preschool with the fire drill safety. Not only do the preschool children participate, but so do the staff and visitors that may be in the building those days. Simplex performs maintenance on our fire alarm system each year, we also have the fire extinguishers checked and certified, along with the Ansul Fire Suppression System in the large kitchen.

### \*Please note the following fire alarm and tornado procedures:

Whenever the fire alarm is activated, it is the responsibility of each individual to exit the building and proceed to the south east corner of the parking lot, near the garage. No one should assume it is "ok" or that it is a false alarm. When a fire alarm is activated, the building services staff is trying to determine if it is a false alarm that can be rectified before the fire department arrives, and we are talking to the emergency dispatch center. EVERYONE must exit the building. Only a member of the building services staff or fire department can determine if it is o.k. to return to the building. All staff and those responsible for the care of others, whether teachers, coaches or staff, are responsible for directing those in their care or under their guidance to the south east corner of the parking lot to the grassy area. During inclement weather, a staff member can access the garage to allow people to wait in the garage.

During a tornado, the building services staff keeps an eye out for weather conditions and listens for the town's tornado sirens. If we hear the sirens, an "all page" will be announced over the phone system and we will direct people to the Fellowship Hall bathrooms. Anyone hearing a tornado siren should automatically take cover in one of the approved locations.

Interior rooms and Hallways without windows and items that can move and fly around are the safest:

Fellowship Hall Bathrooms
South Hall Bathrooms
Preschool Director's Office
Resource Room
Hall between fire doors and fellowship hall

The Preschool children will be ushered in to the Preschool Director's Office, where the doors will be closed and the children are to sit on the floor.

If you are in the south portion of the building, use the south bathrooms.

If you are in the north portion of the building, use the Fellowship Hall Bathrooms

Those in the nursery should take cover in the nursery bathroom and those in the preschool rooms should go in to the Preschool Director's Office

#### **Building and Office Equipment/Repairs:**

The building and grounds budget allows for normal maintenance of the building. There were not any major improvements made however some costly repairs were done due to failing equipment.

Bill Cangiano began painting South Hall. Progress was unfortunately halted due to all of the events throughout the month of December that are held in that area of the church.

Miscellaneous repairs performed (by Mechanical Concepts) on air conditioners, furnaces and the walk-in freezer.

Installed new LED lights in the lounge, room 107.

Carpet cleaning began again in November and will continue through the New Year. Tom Paliga cleaned and repaired our large carpet cleaner and saved us from having to purchase a new one for now. In January it will be used to clean all the neglected large floor areas.

### Office Equipment:

We were able to clean, oil and fix our paper folding machine and the DUPRINTER machine if the copy room. We did this in house without having to pay an outside vendor. We are trying to encourage the use of the DUPRINTER for and bulk black and white printing as this will save the church money. An easy to follow guide has been made and is on the cover of the machine.

### **Annual Report 2017**

### Shari LeMonnier Director of Christian Education and Family Ministry

Looking back on the year, I am amazed at all we have accomplished! It has been busy, but also fulfilling and rewarding to see how well we use our diverse gifts to serve this church, the community, and Jesus Christ. Westminster is a place that truly acts out its mission being a community where people of all ages are transformed by God's love to serve and grow as disciples of Jesus.

Here is a summary of our accomplishments in Christian Education, Family Ministry and Visual Arts Ministry:

### **WPC Kids**

- Katie Boyle, the Superintendent of Sunday School and I created a three year cycle of lessons and stories for this age group 1<sup>st</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> Grade. The year included Epiphany, Jesus as a Boy, John the Baptist, Miracles of Jesus, Superheroes of the Bible, Joseph, Barnabas, Esther, Daniel, Paul, Samson, David, Stories from the Book of Genesis, Tower of Babel, Eli and Samuel, Ruth, and ended with Advent, Mission, Annunciation, The Birth of Jesus, and the Isaiah scripture: And a Little Child Shall Lead Them. These lessons are all taught through a multiple intelligence approach using art, drama, storytelling, games, cooking, science, music and video. This approach allows us to modify our plans to engage our diverse and ever changing group of amazing kids.
- WPC kids mission- We raised \$200 for Nickels for Nets- that is 4000 nets that we provided for children and families who live in areas where mosquito borne illnesses threaten their health.
   Our mission focus since September has been "Fish and Loaves." The kids are especially interested in the days we bake for this group. Yum!
- The annual attendance average was 18.7 kids per week, and we have had 65 different kids throughout the year. However, since our October "Bring a friend to Church" our numbers have risen substantially. October, November, and December average was 28.18, with a high of 46 kids on Nov. 20<sup>th</sup>. What fun!!! I was fortunate to have extra helpers on that day. I heard a comment from a guest parent who said her child came home after Sunday school and asked if they could become Presbyterian! They have attended several times since.
- We held our annual **Bible Bowl**, with Referee Nicole Nida on Feb 7<sup>th</sup>. This event helps the kids review all they have learned since September.
- Vacation Bible School was led by Kelly Rhodes with the Theme "Deep Sea Discovery." This program was based on Genesis 28: 15 "God is with me Wherever I go." Robert Anselmo led the Bible Challenges, Abby Pennannen and Pastor Quincy did storytelling, Julie Glavin thrilled the kids with science, Jean Dixon and Sue Guy led the games, Amy Franklin created luscious and fun snacks, I created the Art Exploration room, and Katie Boyle led the assembly. We had more than 35 volunteers that helped make this program a success.
- New Children's worship bags with crayons and fidget items were created in September. These
  help children stay engaged during worship, and are really appreciated by the parents of small
  children.

Kathy Puchkors helped create a series of hardbound childrens' books from our God's Story
illustrations of Bible Stories. They are absolutely beautiful. I am always amazed at the creative
ways kids see the scriptures we are studying.

### **Family Ministry**

- More than 30 people attended a Family Bowling day at Stardust Bowl on Jan 31.
- On March 5<sup>th</sup>, we had a **Russian themed family night**, Chicken Kiev dinner, stories and activities to celebrate the **Marc Chagall Exhibit**.
- We held our annual **Easter Egg Hunt** on March 26<sup>th</sup> with many people from outside the church who attended for the Easter activities and fun.
- Our focus for Lent was family involvement "Rooted in Christ." We created a Lenten Calendar to go with the theme and planted potatoes in a laundry basket and watched them grow 15'tall before we planted them in the WPC garden.
- The Family Ministry team led by Genevieve Thompson offered a **Summer Book Club** for parents of school aged children. The books discussed were "An Experimental Mutiny against Excess" and "When Breath becomes Air."
- We hosted a Rally Sunday Chili and Cupcake Contest with a talent show as a back to school event.
- Yanina Gomez, wife of the Artist Sergio Gomez, presented a program "Make the Best of Stress" designed to help us optimized energy in the face of challenges.

During 2016, we continued our main mission projects: Loaves & Fishes, Green Matters, Habitat for Humanity, Heart for Africa, Marketplace, Loving Hands, and Living Waters for the World. When trying to think what would be the highlights, I reached out to the team to give a few sentences of their year!

Loaves & Fishes-making healthy meals for the men at the shelter has been more challenging with less groups participating this year and the cooks at WPC have stepped up to cover! Donations are always changing so we welcomed having a new source-Whole Foods and baked goods from different Girl Scout troops!

Green Matters-the group here at WPC is still going strong even though our Mission team member left the church. We would like to add one of them to our team!

Habitat for Humanity-we participated in quite a few on site building projects this year. Many skills are necessary for these projects-painting, planting, nailing, and lunch making! Timing of projects is tricky! We hope to have more hands participate this year!

Heart for Africa-sending diapers, baby clothes, playground games, and so much more was donated through an online drive! Church members could shop and items were sent directly to the shipping container! So many goodies for the children who have so little!

Marketplace-plans are being made to change up the display! New vendors have been added! Look for new items coming!

Loving Hands-a group of about 15 women from different local churches who knit and crochet weekly at WPC with much work being done at home. This year we donated 402 knitted and crocheted hats, 201 scarves and 95 pairs of mittens to 10 local elementary schools in the Hammond, East Chicago, Griffith, and Lake Ridge districts. Lap roles and shawls to nursing homes in Dyer and Whiting. Hats and scarves were given to homeless shelters in Gary and Hammond. WPC's Health & Healing Ministry received prayer shawls for the sick and grieving and baby blankets for new babies in the congregation. Fishes & Loaves received dozens of pot holders, dish cloths, and scrubbies. Hearts in Motion, a local charity, received 118 baby hats and 74 little girls' dresses. Sojourner Truth House were given several dozen hats and scarves of various sizes.

Living Waters for the World- Our participation supported the installation of two water purification systems in Guatemala. The first system was installed in August, our team included a

youth member of our congregation who received a scholarship from the Eric Estill Memorial Fund. In November, using funds raised through various Westminster congregation members and supported by a member of our team and second system was installed. In 2017, we will purchase components for another system and plan to support another installation team!

As a team, we supported different causes that involved the congregation donating: school supplies for the prison ministry, and the Salvation Army Rehab Center's men by sponsoring hats and gloves for Christmas. The 2nd Annual Eric Estill Memorial Run/Walk is an event where everyone can be a part of it. Through the event, many mission causes receive money to continue their efforts and keep doing his good work. The Giving Tree concludes our year-deciding on the giving, to making the ornaments, sitting at the table on Sundays, it brings everything we do together!

# **Caps and Lids Collection**

The "Caps and Lids Collection" is a project designed to keep non-recyclable plastics out of landfills while providing parks, school, and non-profit organizations with useful, durable, and pleasant-looking park benches.

The types of caps and lids being collected include clean

- Snap-On cottage cheese, coffee can, and yogurt lids
- Twist-on medicine, drink, and milk bottles, including the ring
- Flip-top ketchup and condiment bottles
- Large twist-off lids (such as detergent)
- Spout lids (such as squirt mustard)

Unusable are the flimsy lids for fast-food soft-drink cups as well as any items made fully or partially of metal.

This project grew out of an earlier Westminster Pre-school project in which the collection of these non-recyclable plastics that resulted in the bench in the pre-school's playground.

Members are encouraged not to put these materials into the trash, but rather to bring them to church and either give them directly to Ken or Peg Schoon or to leave them in the collection area near the entrance to South Hall. All donated caps and lids are removed from the church and stored at home until they can be taken to the Dunes Learning Center at the Dunes National Lakeshore. Then, when 400 pounds of caps and lids have been received, volunteers from the Pines Village Retirement Home in Valparaiso load them on a truck and take them to Green Tree Plastics in Evansville, Indiana, where they are melted down and formed into a park bench.

The benches are then delivered to the Learning Center where they easily withstand northwest Indiana's weather.

There are no financial costs to WPC for this project.

[The Committee will meet on the first Tuesday of each month starting in January, 2016]

#### Our Purpose:

To provide meaning and continuity to the worship of the congregation To incorporate music and other arts as worship tools in our praise of God To plan a variety of worship and special events that inspire

#### Accomplishments:

**Elements of the service / Benediction** (Bible, Water, Bread and Wine) continue to be brought forward and/or lifted by volunteers. This is a powerful unifying action and begins each traditional service with a meditative "Taize" reminding us of our relationship to God. Every service ended with a sung benediction.

**Bulletin Size** remained in its original two 11x14 folded/stapled for traditional. A single doubled sided 11x14 including announcements and prayer list was used for Contemporary, shifted to  $8 \frac{1}{2}x11$  folded.

**Times Services:** Traditional started at 9:00 a.m. and Contemporary began at 10:45. No action was taken on an evening service is being contemplated by W&M, staff, and session in 2016.

**Ushers** continued to greet and seat members, new and old every Sunday, Sunday school teacher reps were part of the greeting process and children were provided with age appropriate bulletins designed specifically for various needs. Usher schedules were posted in sacristy area behind Narthex.

**Childrens' Chat** existed at both services. Church Sunday school functioned around the shorter time in class with creative thematic design projects. The numbers of children in attendance has increased, decreased, fluctuated with the seasons.

Communion Process Our 9:00 a.m. service had a traditional communion process whereby trays of bread and juice were passed to seated congregants. Eight servers were recruited for each Communion Sunday. In the Contemporary Service, one or two "intinction" stations were used. Elements were taken to homebound each week. A Communion sign up list was passed around in Session and was posted in Narthex. All youth from 5<sup>th</sup> grade through high school were invited into the sanctuary on Communion Sunday to observe the service and to receive the elements. Communion elements were delivered to the Sunday school instructors when they where unable to be in the sanctuary or requested it.

Lent Events began with our Ash Wednesday Service on Feb 10; service was well attended and supported by music and scripture readings as a time for meditation and prayer. Each participant received the mark of the cross with ashes and oil to remind them of rebirth.

**Palm Sunday,** March 20 was heavily attended and each person received a palm branch from a child as they entered. After the opening procession by the children, all others integrated the waving of palms into the service.

Maundy Thursday, March 24, was an agape dinner followed by a service w/ Communion by intinction and sacred music sung by the choir.

On **Good Friday**, the 25, there was a 12:00 Contemporary Service and an 8:00 p.m. Traditional Service The sanctuary was subdued and the cross draped in black and purple as moving choral and instrumental works and sacred texts were performed.

On March 26, a new event called "Sadder Day, A Blues Service" was added. It explored the feeling of hopelessness, loss and sorrow that the followers of Jesus were going through after losing their mentor and friend.

On March 27 our **Easter** theme focused on the Ascension of Christ, The designs were breathtaking and quite spiritual. The Sanctuary was filled with real lilies in wall baskets and across the floor, and, the Cross was draped in white satins. The Hallelujah Chorus was sung. It was a wonderfully attended celebration of the risen Christ.

April 10 was designated **Earth Sunday**. The journey to Guatemala by the Water Reclamation Team was celebrated with a dinner. The water mission team provided the food and participants purchased a dinner served at 5 p.m.

**Pentecost Sunday / Confirmation Sunday** took pace on May 15. The fire-like designed mini blinds were used from past years to add shimmering movement and spirit to the events.

On June 5 Senior Sunday service was led by the H.S. seniors. The service has a large attendance.

The Outdoor Service, designed and led by John Higley, and Pastor Quincy Worthington, featured a professional Bourbon Blue Grass Band. Historical signage was posted around the pie and ice cream tent, and, as in years past, the attendance was heavy. The weather was great and so was the pie and ice cream social. It was a wonderful time to share beyond our walls. This service integrated the joy, faith, and spirit of our nation.

Advent Chairs, Mike and Mary Pawlicki served as leaders from Sept.1 until Epiphany Sunday. They and Pastor Q. chose the theme "And a Child Shall lead them." Sermons were based on Peace, Hope, Love, and Joy. Coordinating with Mary, Shari Le Monnier designed two richly detailed silk banners for the front of the sanctuary. The elegant tree decorations for the interior of the sanctuary were once again placed by the team of Advent volunteers coordinated by Mike Moses, Bill Cangiano, Sara & Tim Sweeney, Steve and Sandy Coxhead, and the Pawlickis The large Mission Christmas tree, set up by the Moses family was decorated with hundreds of small ornaments color coordinated with the He'Qi Art Display in Fellowship Hall, and represented the enormous mission giving of the congregants. All was beautiful!

The Longest Night Service was sparsely attended, but because of it intimacy and focus it was quite moving. All gathered around the Communion table to received communion.



# Stephen Ministry Annual Report 2016



The Stephen Ministry Program has been a part of WPC since the first class of Stephen Ministers was commissioned in 1992. Stephen Ministers are well-trained WPC congregation members who provide high quality emotional and spiritual support to people who are hurting. This ministry is dedicated to providing one-on-one Christ-centered care to individuals experiencing crisis, difficulties or changes in their lives. It has flourished under God's guidance and the dedication of each Stephen Minister.

Stephen Ministers care for people with a wide range of ministry needs: both men and women; those experiencing grief, divorce, unemployment, hospitalization, loneliness, spiritual crisis, financial stress, rehabilitation after an injury, terminal illness, relocation, long-term disability and countless other life difficulties. Stephen Leaders are trained at week long conferences provided by Stephen Ministries located in St Louis, Mo.

In turn, those people wishing to become Stephen Ministers are trained here at Westminster Church by our Stephen Leaders utilizing all materials provided by St. Louis headquarters. In the fall of 2016, Westminster Stephen Leaders partnered with 3 members from Ridge United Methodist Church to reactivate a Stephen Minister Chapter. Two new Stephen Ministers were also trained for our WPC Chapter. To date, Westminster sponsors 13 active Stephen Ministers, 5 Stephen Leaders, and 8 Inactive members that can be called upon at any time for leadership or client contact if needed.

Nancy Quinn, our Referral Coordinator, receives all initial contact with potential care receivers. Nancy, utilizing the counsel of WPC minister and/or other Stephen Leaders will determine the type of request: should this contact be referred to a professional agency or is this a contact that should be assigned to a Stephen Minister utilizing their talents to best match the needs of the incoming care receiver. Current active Stephen Leaders are Ed Harrison, Linda Kauffman, Belva Knight, Nancy Quinn and Sally Saculla.

Margie Bahner continues as the Supervision Coordinator. She does a phenomenal job of planning and conducting the monthly Supervision meetings. Her efforts to keep all Stephen Minsters advised of Supervision and continuing education meetings are always timely. Margie's dedicated service is an enormous asset to Stephen Ministry at WPC (and she always invites all past and present Stephen Minsters to her home each summer for a "Kick Off the Season" pot luck supper).

Stephen Ministry continues to partner with the Health and Healing Team (Darlene Smith) to present Continuing Education programs on the 1st Wednesday of most months. These presentations are open to the congregation and the community. They are advertised in the church bulletin, WPC Newsletter and the local newspapers.

The Stephen Ministry Program partners with Darlene Smith, (Parish Nurse) and the Health and Healing Ministry to utilize the skills of Stephen Ministers for home and hospital visits for WPC members and family members. We also occasionally have referrals from The Samaritan Center for people in need of assistance with "life troubles".

As care givers for people in crisis we ask for your ongoing prayers as we Stephen Ministers continue to rely on God to be the cure giver in this ministry.
